Project Steno Announces Stenograph Funded Robert T. Wright Memorial Scholarship

Project Steno is pleased to announce a new scholarship opportunity: Stenograph's Robert T. Wright Memorial Scholarship. This merit-based two-year scholarship, worth up to \$5,000 per year, includes use of a student writer and software (payments will be made directly to the student's school/program to cover all costs for two years).

Students accepted into Project Steno's tuition assistance will receive an application directly from Nancy Varallo.

The winning entry will be announced during Court Reporting and Captioning Week, February 8-15, 2020.
